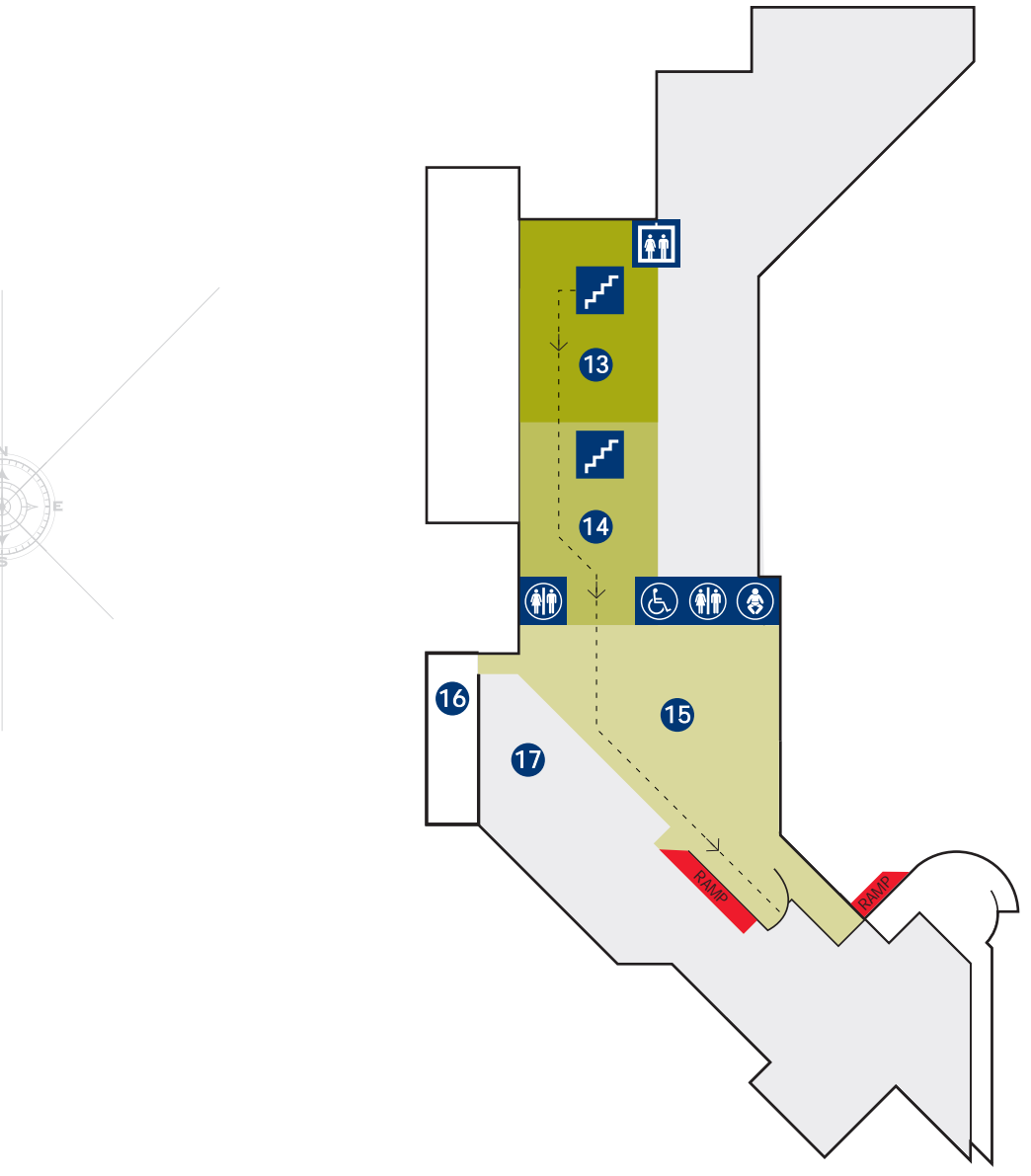
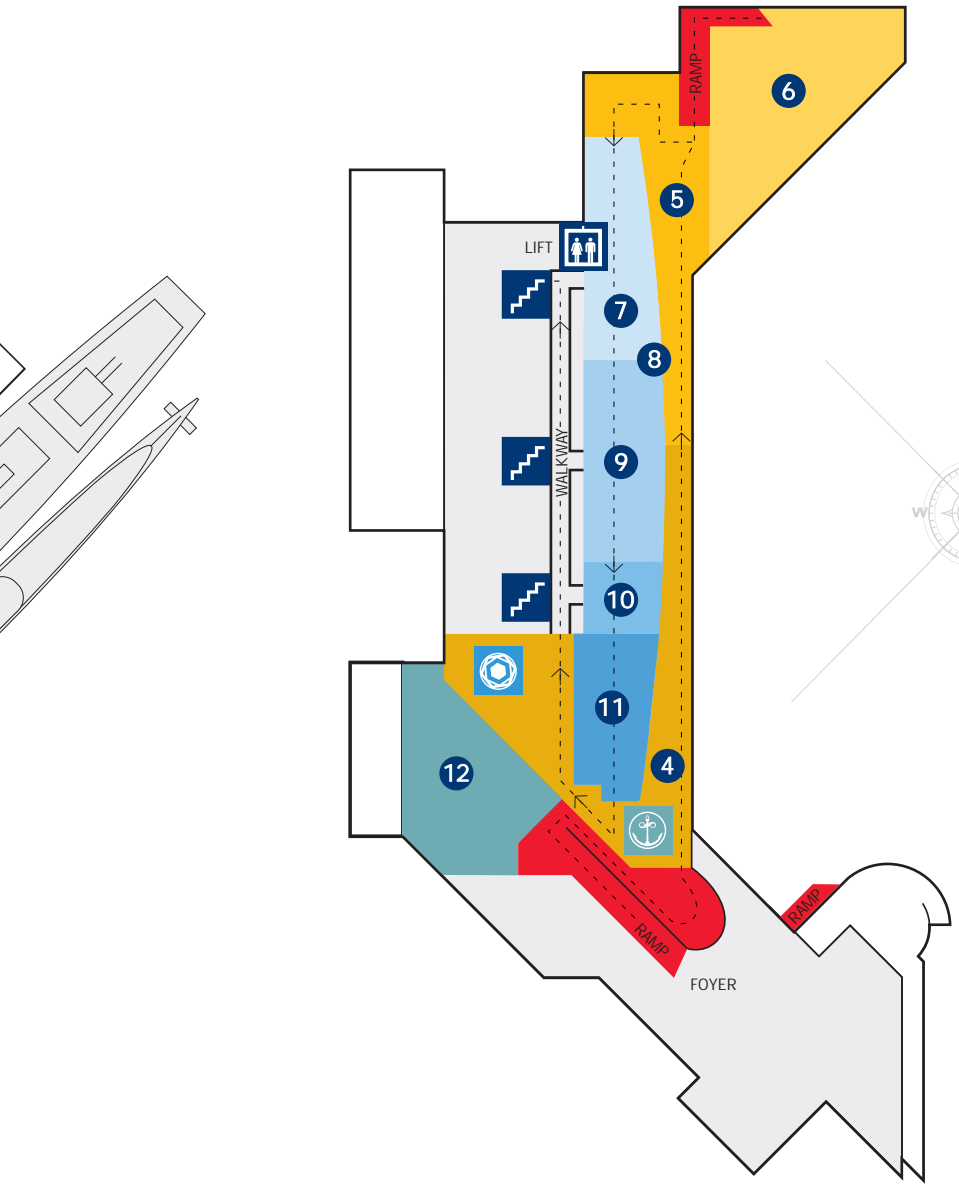

**1 HMAS Vampire**  
The last big gun ship built in Australia before the introduction of guided missiles. Destroyer HMAS Vampire served in the Royal Australian Navy from 1959 to 1986.

**2 HMAS Onslow**  
What was life like for the thousands of sailors who lived and worked below the waves in silent, secret submarines? HMAS Onslow served in the Royal Australian Navy from 1969 to 1999.

**3 HMB Endeavour**  
The magnificent replica of Captain Cook's famous vessel of discovery. The ship is presented as if Captain Cook and his crew had just walked off sometime on their epic 1768-1771 circumnavigation.

**4 Special Exhibitions**  
Look for outstanding and constantly changing exhibitions in the Nortel Networks Gallery, North Gallery, South Gallery and the USA Gallery.

**7 Commerce**  
The working sea – Australia, the island continent, has always depended on the sea, prospering with the development of ports, whaling, fishing and shipping.

**8 Passengers Theatrette**  
Small theatrette for film and performances.

**9 Passengers**  
The long sea voyage – Millions of people crossed the seas to make new homes in Australia... convicts and settlers in sailing ships, migrants in ocean liners and, more recently, refugees in frail fishing boats.

**10 Merana Eora Nora**  
First people – The diverse cultures of Australia's Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities share common themes in their strong connections to the land and sea.

**11 Navigators**  
Defining Australia – European navigators came in the 17th, 18th and 19th centuries in search of knowledge, new lands and trade. The Great South Land took shape as New Holland and finally Australia.

**12 The Theatre**  
The 210-seat ANZ Theatre is fully equipped for films, performances, seminars, lectures and conferences.

**16 Peter Doyle Learning Centre**  
This education facility is equipped for a variety of workshops, classes and meetings – for visitors of all ages.

**17 Members' Lounge**  
Members and their guests are welcome to relax and enjoy complimentary refreshments served in an elegant private lounge.

**18 Welcome Wall**  
The Welcome Wall stands as a lasting tribute to the millions of migrants from almost every country in the world who have crossed the seas to make a new home in Australia.

**19 Wharf 7 Maritime Heritage Centre**  
Home to Sydney Heritage Fleet's collection of wooden boats, marine engines and ship models.

**20 James Craig**  
Sydney Heritage Fleet's 1874 square-rigger James Craig, a great survivor from the age of sail, has been rescued and restored to sail again.
